U.S. Coast Guard Patrol Boat Joint Adoption

Imperial Valley and Palm Springs Councils to adopt USCGC Petrel and USCGC Sea Otter

In July 2011 the Imperial Valley and Palm Springs Councils held a joint ceremony for the adoption of the USCGC Sherman (WHEC 720) and the USCGC Boutwell (WHEC 719) in San Diego. In January of this year, our Council learned Sherman had been reassigned to Japan, and as a result we were "losing" our San Diego-based cutter.

At the same time, Palm Springs Council has learned that Boutwell's long-storied service is coming to an end, and is scheduled for decommissioning in 2016. As the adoption of both our cutters come to a close, we have been seeking to replace our Coast Guard sponsored ships to continue to provide support to all our sea services.

During our September dinner, our guest CDR Eric Cooper, Deputy Commander of Coast Guard Sector 11 has been working with both our councils to locate two "unadopted" assets in San Diego. As a result, we are pleased to announce an upcoming adoption ceremony whereby Imperial Valley will adopt USCGC Petrel, and Palm Springs will adopt USCGC Sea Otter on Friday, December 11, 2015 at 10:00 a.m. at Naval Base Point Loma. Following the ceremony, lunch and tours of the USCGC Petrel and USCGC Sea Otter will commence.

We invite you to make your plans now, and join us in San Diego as we make our formal commitment of support to the command and crew of these fine Coast Guard ships. This is a unique opportunity to interact with the crewmembers and their families, and show them how much we appreciate their service.

Marine Corps to Celebrate 240th Birthday

Founded on November 10, 1775

The Marine Corps is celebrating its 240th birthday this month. Established in Philadelphia when the Continental Marines were charged with fighting from the land and the sea. The Corps has about 194,000 active duty members throughout the world.

The Marine Corps' motto is "Semper fidelis" (always faithful) but there's plenty of other unique things about the Corps you may not know about them. According to the USO, here are some interesting facts:

- The Marine Corps' first amphibious raid was only weeks after its creation when Marines successfully stormed a British weapons cache in the Bahamas.
- The Marines' first land battle on foreign soil was in Libya, where 600 Marines stormed the city of Derna to rescue the crew of the USS Philadelphia from pirates.
- Male Marine recruits attend boot camp in one of two locations, depending on which side of the Mississippi they're from: Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego for West Coast recruits and MCRD Parris Island for East Coast recruits. Female recruits only attend MCRD Parris Island.
- You can see Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego from the air if you fly into or out of San Diego International Airport.
- Marine recruits are finished eating the moment their drill instructor is finished. This is why Marines eat so fast.
- Fewer than 100 people have received the title of honorary Marine, a title that can only be bestowed by the Commandant of the Marine Corps. Here are a few of their names and ranks in order of seniority: Brig. Gen. Bob Hope, Master Sgt. Bugs Bunny, Cpl. Jim Nabors, star of Gomer Pyle, U.S.M.C. and actor Gary Sinise.
- The license plate of the Commandant of the Marine Corps reads "1775."
- Marines in uniform are not authorized to put their hands in their pockets.
- In the Corps, because of the total hours off, a three-day weekend is called a "72" and a four-day weekend is called a "96."
- Marines are often called jarheads because of their high-and-tight haircuts.

Sequestration Action Center

What is Sequestration?

Sequestration refers to \$1.2 trillion in mandatory across-the-board cuts from the federal budget as required in the Budget Control Act. In the summer of 2011, Congress was in deadlock over the issue of whether to raise the debt ceiling and how to reduce the federal deficit. In the Budget Control Act, both sides agreed to form a "budget supercommittee" which was required to find \$1.3 trillion in cuts or else \$1.2 trillion cuts would be made across-the-board. As a result of the committee's failure to reach a deal, half of the \$1.2 trillion in mandatory cuts will come from security spending and half from non-security discretionary spending. A bipartisan budget deal avoided sequestration for fiscal years 2014 and 2015. This deal will expire at the end of the fiscal year on September 30, 2015, opening the door to a new round of draconian cuts. Many bipartisan reports and independent studies continue to show that the indiscriminant cuts would result in another recession and would gut our national defense.

The Navy League recognizes the danger that sequestration poses to our military, homeland security, defense industrial base and the economy at large. The Navy League urges the Congress to avoid sequestration and find a bipartisan solution that finds targeted cuts that reduce waste while preserving those programs that are important to the health, safety, security and success of our great nation.

The best way for a citizen like you to help avoid Sequestration is to contact your Congressman and Senators and urge them to find a solution that does not hurt our economy and national security.
